NATIONAL HISTORIC PRESERVATION FUND IS SEVERLY CUT BY CARTER

The President has just announced grave program cuts for 1980 and 1981 revised Budget figures which will severely hit the efforts at preservation here and around the country. Current \$55 million funding may be cut to \$38.5 in Federal dollars allocated through the States to local groups and cities for acquisition and development. Furthermore, the Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service responsible for historic preservation programs in the Interior Department would get the heaviest cut in that department, and the National Historic Preservation Fund would go from \$45 to \$25million.

If you oppose such cuts into the Federal structure which backs up preservation efforts, consider dropping a quick line to the Appropriations Subcommittees on Interior of both the House and Senate, to Congressman Dellums and also be sure to send a copy to: The Honorable Cecil Andrus, Secretary of Interior

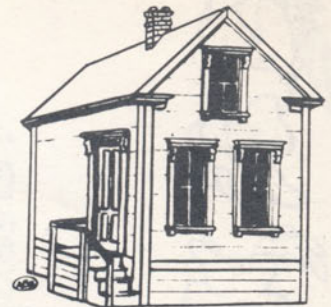
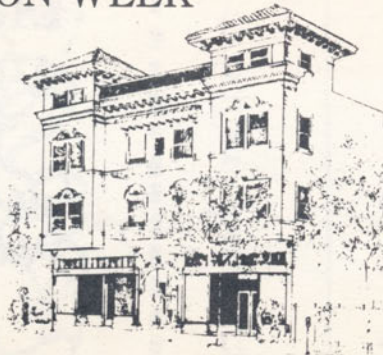
Preservation Week

National Historic Preservation Week is cosponsored annually by the National Trust for Historic Preservation and by local preservation groups throughout the country. This year the national observance is also cosponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy. "Preservation: Reusing America's Energy" is the theme.

The purposes of Preservation Week are to provide a specific time in which to recognize outstanding preservation efforts, and to make more Americans aware of the preservation movement and its contributions to the quality of life, thereby involving more people and gaining greater support from the public.

Recent as well as long-term trends have proved the need to conserve energy. The built environment represents the largest single investment of energy. In fact, to replace all the existing buildings in the United States would require the entire world's energy output for a year for materials and construction alone.



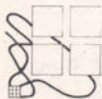

At last month's State Historic Preservation Conference in Sacramento, many Berkeley faces could be seen among the large group of historic preservationists gathered from around the State of California. Among the B.A.H.A. people attending were Robert Breuer, Christopher Adams, Trish Hawthorne, Stephanie Manning, Lesley Emmington and John Merritt. Conference events and workshops focused on all the complexities of making historic preservation an ongoing and effective aspect of life in local communities

If you think that you would like to enjoy an introduction to other California preservation activists in a most pleasant atmosphere, plan to attend the Californians for Preservation Action at their annual meeting in Santa Cruz on Saturday, May 31. The daylong session will be held in the newly established Loudon Nelson Community Center at 301 Center Street and will be co-hosted by the Historic Preservation Commission of the City of Santa Cruz, the Santa Cruz County Historical Society and the Santa Cruz Society for Historic Preservation. The community is proud of what it has accomplished and has been most effectively innovative with programs of historic building stock retention and reuse, neighborhood preservation, and a comprehensive program which makes preservation evident as part of the community life of Santa Cruz. Their local legislation in this area would be most instructive for us here in Berkeley. Discussions on the Heritage Policy Act of 1979 and the Community Reinvestment Act of 1977, walking tours of the town, a luncheon at the Cedar Street Gallery and an early evening wine tasting reception will be featured. Registration is at 9:30 A.M.

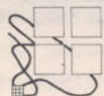
